


Learning from home

We understand it can be very difficult to be motivated and resilient to work at home independently, especially when learning new things that would normally be taught in class by a teacher!


Reese in year 8 is one such student who has been fantastic in keeping up with his learning every day, sticking to his timetable and completing the work set to the best of his ability. Where really tricky topics have come up he has persevered, searching out videos and explanations on the internet to help him. He has also engaged brilliantly with 1:1 lessons on Zoom with his maths teacher. It has worked well as he is able to share his work visually with his teacher, and his teacher can show him things to help whilst explaining verbally at the same time.

Zoom is a safe way to have face-to-face video call meetings, set up easily through email and accessible on laptop or phone. All staff are able to use Zoom and will be using it more in the coming weeks and months to keep in contact with students unable to come to school. If there are aspects of learning that students would like help with at home, please suggest that your regular tutor phone calls could be held on Zoom instead.

FACT: There is a clear link between poor attendance at school and lower academic achievement.

Of pupils who miss more than 50 per cent of school only three per cent manage to achieve five or more GCSEs at grades A* to C including Maths and English. 73 per cent of pupils who have over 95 per cent attendance achieve five or more GCSEs at grades A* to C.


Message from Head of Key Stage 4

It feels very strange to think that the summer holidays are upon us and another academic year has passed. Without the usual GCSE exams, Thorpe park trip or leavers assembly as milestones to wrap up the year, it all feels very different. That being said, it has been excellent seeing many of our pupils regularly attending school through out the last two terms and we have seen the majority of pupils if only for shorter periods of times. This has without a doubt been one of the strangest and challenging periods of time whilst being at the school, but one positive is, it has given us a chance to really focus on next year and making sure we will be ready from the get go in September. As I like to repeatedly say, Key Stage 4 really are two very important years, and ones that will fly by, just ask any of the year 11s that are leaving! With this in mind, I would really urge parents, carers and pupils to make every effort with regards to attendance come September. Uniform

A quick reminder that the uniform consists of;

- Plain White Long Sleeved Shirt or Plain White Polo Shirt or White BGS Polo Shirt
- Black BGS Jumper
- Black Trousers or Black Skirt
- Black Shoes.
- Jewellery a wristwatch and a single stud in each ear are permitted.
- Facial piercings are not permitted.
- Hair must be of standard school style with no extremes in colour, cut or styling.

Uniform can be purchased at the office at the cost of £12.50 for a Jumper and £8.50 for a Polo Shirt.

PE T-shirts are available for purchase from the school office for £7.00

Please inform us of any changes as soon as they occur so that we can update our contact systems. We are especially in need of your email address' as in order to save costs we will be sending more communications electronically.
