



A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

Dear Parents and Carers,

In the absence of our Headteacher, Jo Grayson, I have stepped in as Interim Headteacher for the last term. I have very much enjoyed stepping back into the day-to-day running of North Star 240° and working much closer with our students once again. I hope you will enjoy reading about what your young people have been doing.

As always, the time has flown by; but, as staff and students, we have achieved a considerable amount already in what can be the most difficult terms of the year. Our new year 7 students and new starters across the school have settled into secondary school life superbly and I feel like they've been with us at North Star 240° for years, which is brilliant. It's also been lovely to see our older students in both key stage 3 and key stage 4 welcoming the new students and 'showing them the ropes' in order to make their transition that little bit easier.

As part of our flying start to the year, we've hosted the author of the Ultimate Football Heroes book series, Matt Oldfield. He came and ran two sessions with our students to discuss resilience, setbacks and sport and inspire our young people to improve their reading skills. We also recently hosted the Avon and Somerset Constabulary Early Intervention Team who delivered sessions to our students on topics such as sexting and online safety. Both Matt and the police officers were superbly engaging and informative and our students gained so much from the visits.

Our enrichment programme has picked up where it left off last year and our KS3 pupils have enjoyed trips to Aerospace Bristol, Bristol Museum and MShed, as well as taking part in swimming, construction and catering lessons and forest school. Similarly, to last year, the KS3 tutor groups will take it in turn to take part in all the enrichment activities over the course of the year in order to learn and improve their practical and social skills and experience different opportunities and activities. Over in KS4, our year 11 Duke of Edinburgh students have started their silver awards and as part of this, they have been volunteering at North Star 82° and assisting the teachers and the students. They will be doing this for six months in order to complete the very difficult award!

Of course, the first two terms haven't been without their challenges. Starting school again after the summer holidays can be really tough for our young people and it can take time to settle back into the routines of school and education. At the end of the school year, we had to say goodbye to staff who had worked with our students for a long time and then we welcomed new people to the team in September. This has not been easy for us, as adults, let alone our young people, so I am so proud of the whole school for how well they have adapted to new surroundings and changing environments. It hasn't all been plain sailing; however, it has been admirable how resilient and determined our youngsters can be when they put their minds to it and I feel very proud to get to see this in your children.

I want to thank you for everything you do to support the school and your child's education. Whether this be supporting our behaviour policy or reading with your child so they are more confident when they come to school, it makes a massive difference on the progress of our young people. And, of course, we will continue to support you and your families as much as we can. Similarly, with the Covid-19 pandemic, we are facing more difficult times this winter, so it is vital we all stick together. If you have not seen it already, we have set up a support section on the Parents and Carers page of the website. This is full of financial support, local groups that you can join, and pages with supportive phone lines and advice to help get through this difficult time. However, please do speak to school staff members if you need any advice or support from us.

I hope you all have a nice Christmas break and make the most of an opportunity to spend time with your families.



ENGLISH

The students have been exploring sensory language and rhyming pairs in order to structure their independent poems. In Year 7, we have been looking at the Polar regions in VIP to help support our understanding of the winter climate. In Year 9, students have been studying a non-fiction text all about Ernest Shackleton. They have been writing in character and creating fact files about crew members. For reading this term, students have been attending the library for a 'book café' and exploring new interesting reads with varying genres. The students have been continuing to work really hard in their English lessons and have been creating lots of personal best work.

GCSE Students are developing their own ideas and responses to a number of exciting topics such as natural form and identity . This has created opportunities for students to explore a variety of art subject areas and skills such as textile design, three-dimensional design, painting, collage and print. Discovering imaginative and innovative ways of working and understanding media, materials and technology through overcoming a variety of challenges. Producing amazing responses that evidence mastery of many materials and techniques such as detailed silk painting and Lino prints to bold , bright ink paintings.



Key stage 3 students have developed their observational drawing skills and explored the art of famous artists in history such as Keith Haring and Andy Goldsworth .Students have been supported in exploring materials and techniques such as, watercolour, acrylic ,collage and print inspired by their artist. Revisiting previous explorations, developing a deeper knowledge in elements of art such as line, shape, texture, form, space, colour and value



CULTURAL CAPITAL VISITS AND SCHOOL TRIPS



As part of our enrichment activities, our students at North Star 240° have had some brilliant Cultural Capital visits up to now.

They've sat in aircraft simulators at Aerospace Bristol, tried on old-school military uniform at Berkeley Castle, walked on the Suspension Bridge and had a journey in time in MShed and Bristol Museum. All students involved enjoyed their visits and joined in workshops where they built space rockets, flied them, created their own coat of arms and built bridges.



We've also been lucky enough to go on some awesome school trips this year.

Climbing walls, bowling, and tobogganing are just some of the highlights and on each trip our young people have had an opportunity to let off some steam and take some time away from the classroom to have some fun.



AUTHOR MATT OLDFIELD VISITS NS240°

On the 5th October, North Star 240 was visited by Matt Oldfield, author of the acclaimed *Football Heroes* series, as well as *Unbelievable Football*, and *Johnny Ball: Accidental Football Genius*. He ran workshops on resilience and story telling with our KS3 students, who all participated brilliantly, and asked many fascinating questions. Using Gareth Bale's early injury problems as a basis to explore the theme of resilience, the students came up with their own stories for overcoming problems and achieving greatness. Year 8 student Alfie Wlaznik reports:



“He explained the books that he’d written—both fiction and non-fiction. We asked him lots of questions about new books he might be writing in the future, and gave him some new ideas—like *Deadly Duos*, a book about siblings who are both footballers. He said he liked our ideas and he might make a book about them. It was fun, it was interactive, it was inspirational. He was really kind and funny.”

It was a great day for our students, and perhaps it inspired some of them to pick up a pen and write about their passions!


CHILDREN IN NEED 2022

TEAMING UP WITH AVON AND SOMERSET POLICE



North Star 240° has enjoyed the Avon and Somerset Constabulary Early Intervention Team's first visit to the school. As part of their intervention programme and our PSHE curriculum, we will have termly sessions with them on these topics: online Safety, hate crime, knife crime, antisocial behaviour, child criminal exploitation (County Lines), peer on peer abuse, gender-based violence, stop & search.

In their first visit, officers used slightly different methods to engage our students – they put our teachers in handcuffs – to explain and show the equipment they carry in their job. The three police officers that gave up their time to talk to our young people introduced themselves in a very engaging way. They also spoke about what their jobs involve and why they do them, and they even came out for a kick about on the football pitch during breaktime.



CAREERS AT NS240°

A key part of our careers strategic plan is Job of the week. Every Monday a different job is sent out and looked at in tutor time and then referenced throughout the week across all of their different lessons. This is giving exposure of many different career paths to all students so they can then choose to explore further any jobs that they may be interested in.

Below is an example of the information included using the week which was a sports coach. The information includes an informative poster which is displayed in the classroom, roles and responsibilities, career pathways, labour market information (statistics on jobs in our area) as well as live job adverts.

What do you think a sports coach does?

Your day-to-day duties might include:

If you're working with schools and community groups, you'll:

- plan fun, engaging coaching activities, sessions and programmes in a safe environment
- give feedback on performance and help to improve technique
- work with young people, schools, community groups and sports organisations to promote the sport

If you're working with young people involved in competitive sport, you'll:

- design basic training programmes
- work on developing more advanced techniques and tactics
- support performers at events and competitions

If coaching at national or international level you'll:

- design challenging and varied training programmes
- monitor the physical condition and mental attitude of the people you coach
- work with experts in sport like sports scientists, nutritionists, physiotherapists and programme managers
- mentor other coaches



College

You can do a qualification at college like a Level 3 Diploma in Coaching. Many courses are specific to a particular sport, for example coaching tennis or basketball.

Entry requirements

4 or 5 GCSEs at grades 9 to 4 (A* to C), or equivalent, for a level 3 course

Apprenticeship

You can start by doing an advanced apprenticeship in sports coaching.

University

- You can take a foundation degree, higher national diploma or degree in:
 - sports coaching and development
 - sports and exercise science
 - sports studies
 - physical education

Entry requirements

- 1 or 2 A levels, or equivalent, for a foundation degree or higher national diploma
- 2 to 3 A levels, or equivalent, for a degree


ANTI-BULLYING WEEK AT NS240°
